Students drew a picture of a friendly Alien based on an eassy they wrote in the class.









February has been a busy month at both CISB campuses. Both had Literacy Weeks, during which the pleasure and importance of reading were stressed. As well, both Junior and Senior campuses celebrated Mother Language Day (although it was a day early). As a bonus, the children (and parents) of the Junior school through sales of traditional foods raised over 18000 Taka for distribution to local charities. Earlier in the month, the whole school enjoyed

a walk in Gulshan Ladies Park, a fun event organized by "Thrive", that helped raise lunch money for disadvantaged children attending local public schools. There was an 'Arts Day in the Park' during which students painted, wrote poems, and short stories. Certificates were distributed to the best of the best among our children. After-school activities began as well, with students enjoying sports and artistic time with their friends. In between all this, there were examinations for the high school students, and reports followed to Parents. Official visitation from Nova Scotia























Mr. Jerry Thibeau and Mr. Karem Amedjkouh visited both the CISB schools in Dhaka. Mr Thibeau is Director of International Programs for the Department of Education, Province of Nova Scotia and Mr. Amedjkouh is a French teacher in an International Baccalaureate school in Nova Scotia. Both inspectors visited classrooms, interviewed administrators, talked with groups of parents, teachers, and students looking for ways to help us become an even better Nova Scotia school.
