


Having to touch the bubbles is fun way to learn about sense of touch.




Grade 2 students are learning about 3-D objects, such as cubes, spheres, cylinder, prisms and pyramids. Using 3-D solids in construction.



This is to grow their media literacy skills and be able to engage with a variety of text types in the real world.

CISB CAS Trip





















Designed especifically to challenge and inspire International Baccalaureate students, this CISB CAS (Creativity Activity Service) trip to Shishu Polli combined service learning with cultural immersion and practical conservation work.

Under the tutorship of an experienced facilitator, our students had the chance to carry out hands-on work and explore the wilderness of the rural area of Gazipur.

Going beyond the limits of a normal educational field trip, our students were able to develop a genuine understanding and make a real difference by assisting the NGO. Their contribution through making handicraft, planting vegetables, painting, playing games and agro work gave them an opportunity to transform their CAS experience into something they'll remember for the rest of their lives.
